

Event Types

Panel Discussion

Panel discussions are based on a series of questions posed to the writers with the purpose of stimulating conversation. Featuring two or more writers, guided by a panel convener the conversations that occur are entertaining and engaging, and often involve questions from the audience.

In Conversation with...

An 'In Conversation' is a more traditional interview-style presentation, with the writer answering questions. Frequently, an 'In Conversation' is a more intimate discussion, almost like two people having a chat over a cup of coffee, but with forty other people looking on.

Kathy Heys

Kathy Heys graduated from UWA with a degree in English Literature and a Graduate Diploma of Education and embarked on a career teaching in public schools. She is the Head of English at Coodanup College, a position she has held for eight years. Highlights of Kathy's reading journey include meeting Markus Zusak and visiting Jane Austen's house. Kathy is also currently studying Creative Writing at Curtin University.



Josephine Taylor

Josephine Taylor is a writer and editor and an Adjunct Senior Lecturer in Writing at Edith Cowan University. Her debut novel, *Eye of a Rook* (Fremantle Press, 2021), was shortlisted in the WA Premier's Book Awards and her short-form writing has been anthologised and published widely. Josephine is regularly requested as a teacher, mentor, moderator and judge in literary fiction and creative non-fiction. She was a 2022 Emerging Writer-in-Residence at the Katharine Susannah Prichard Writers' Centre, where she began work on her second novel.



Nicholas Reynolds

Nicholas Reynolds obtained a Bachelor of Arts from the University of WA in 1998 majoring in history. His area of expertise was British Colonial history. He also holds a Certificate in Museum Studies from Edith Cowan University. After graduating he became involved with the Army Museum of WA as museum registrar.


