I've just returned after a relaxing break visiting the in-laws in the US state of Texas. Texas is the home of many museums that focus on subjects from local history to two presidential libraries devoted to Texans who rose to lead the United States. I was fortunate enough to visit one of these, The Lyndon B Johnson presidential library at the university of Texas in Austin, the state capital. All US presidents of the modern era are interested in cementing their place in US history almost as soon as they leave office. These libraries serve primarily as repositories for the huge amount of material, written or otherwise, that future researchers and historians will reply upon to write their histories. Most of the libraries feature a small, in relative terms, museum that gives a taste of the president's time in office using material from their incredibly extensive archives. The 'LBJ' museum provides a thoughtful look at his career and influence on world history. We'll now take a look at a few photos that I took during my visit which will serve as a highlight of how this museum is put together.

Continued from November newsletter. **Para - Olympic Games.**

The Para Games were the initiative of Sir George Bedbrook who was director of the Spinal Unit of Royal Perth Hospital. Two years after the first Royal Perth Hospital Games in 1954, Bedbrook was encouraged to organise para sport in Australia and by 1959, the Paraplegic Association of WA began to promote the 1962 Paraplegic Empire Games.

While these Games are now run conjointly with the abled games, during Perth's time, the para-athletes were run just prior to the commencement of the able games. This may have been to their favour as the other games was run in some of the hottest weather ever experienced in November in Perth. The Para- Commonwealth Games have been integrated with the Commonwealth Games since1974.

The 1962 British Commonwealth Paraplegic Games were held over eight days, nine nations and 93 athletes competed, with Australia topping the medal table with 38 gold and 90 medals total.

Sports included on the program were archery, Dartchery (a combination of darts and archery), athletics, swimming, weightlifting, pentathlon, fencing, snooker, basketball and table tennis.

These Games, opened by state Governor, Sir Charles Gairdner on the 10th of November were held until the 17th of November.

The Claremont Showgrounds were used for many of the events with Beatty Park aquatic centre being used for swimming events. Athletes for these games were also housed at Claremont showgrounds.



Dr Gaynor Harry, an athlete from Wales, wrote "Then was the moment to think of the fabulous organization that went into the Games, from start to finish there wasn't a hitch. If we needed a postage stamp, that was easy. If licking the back of it had given us a thirst for iced water, that was easy too. The highest tribute that can be paid is that it all appeared so effortless, as though it all just happened"

The organising committee decided at the outset that transport would be a major issue and ultimately reflect on the success of the Games. The decision to locate most of the events and accommodation at Claremont Showgrounds reduced many of the issues. Car companies in Perth made cars available and volunteer drivers assisted in taking athletes and officials around Perth, particularly to Beatty Park. The biggest issue was encountered by teams from the United Kingdom that had to travel 20,000 miles (32,000 km). A total of 57 athletes and 23 escorts travelled from the United Kingdom in a chartered Caledonian Airways plane at the cost of 18,500 Pounds. The long flight required refuelling in Bahrain and a stopover in Colombo, Ceylon. Health checks such as measuring legs and ankles for swelling were undertaken during the flight to Perth and back home.

The flag was the Games emblem of a javelin thrower in a wheelchair with a background outline of the Flag of Australia on a flagpole in a slight breeze. Medals had one side with the games emblem and the reverse side name of sport with room for engraving. Badges were given to each competitor and official with the aims of identification and access to the

dining hall. The badge also became a memento of the games.



Opening the Perth Commonwealth Games.

In the presence of 863 athletes with 178 official, and a multitude of visitors to our state plus people of Perth, the Duke of Edinborough opened the Games on the 22nd of November. The Duke also was present at the closing of the games. Other special guests included Sir Robert Menzies.

This opening was just five days after the Para - Games finished. However, the weather was to be especially harsh, from a projected 80 degrees fahrenheit, all spectators and participants sweltered in 105 degrees within the newly built Perry Lakes Stadium.

This extreme weather was to continue until the games ended on the 1st of December. Soldiers were used to take water to athletes during these times. Volunteers from all walks of life gave up time to assist in many ways to provide the games success. Amongst these were the drivers of the 103 vehicles which were on loan from various businesses, there were also the caterers and administration many of whom were volunteers.

Especially in demand were those volunteers from the St. John Ambulance who were kept busy for most of the time. They not only dealt with injuries but the consequences of the extreme heat. My father was one of them and he commented on trying to manage heat stroke.

James Coote of the London Daily Telegraph wrote at the time: "The VIIth Commonwealth Games have proved that it is possible for an area as basically devoid of sports interest as Perth to stage the second most important sports meeting in the World - and stage it successfully. Perth has shown that these Games will continue for years to come." **Interesting fact.** While Western Australia and Australia were eagerly awaiting our special event, the world stage was taken up by an International Crisis.

The Cuban Missile Crisis was the consequence of many events, however, in October 1962 Russia was building missiles just off the coast of America. Everything came to a head when after advice and discussion, President John F Kennedy ordered a naval blockade of Cuba.

This event lasted between 16th and 29th of October 1962. This was less than two weeks prior to the opening of the Para - Games.

Memorabilia from these events are held at the Museum of Perth.

Much of the information provided in this newsletter on the Perth Commonwealth Games has come from websites belonging to various organisations. However, at no time in watching the videos or reading through their sites have I been able to see a photo of the baton for that games.

Maritime Moorings.

Meanwhile on November 25th, Michael McGhie, Kay & Brian Toussaint were at the WA Museum—Boola Bardip to attend the WA Heritage Awards as finalists for 2022. While the Maritime Group did not win, it is wonderful to see their hard work recognised and promoted. Below is a short statement which accompanied the invitation. Plus the virtual medal they are permitted to show on stationary.

'On behalf of the Minister for Heritage and the Heritage Council of Western Australia, I would like to congratulate Friends of Mandurah Museum on being named a finalist in the 'Contribution by a Community-based Organisation' category. Without commitment, passion, dedication and extremely hard

President Johnson's wife Claudia, universally known as Lady Bird, maintained an office in the library building for many years after her husband's death in 1973. Here we can see the office preserved as it was during Lady Bird's lifetime. Lady Bird passed away in 2007 at the age of 95.

Interactive elements of the exhibition featured telephone handset style audio 'listening posts' which draw on the extensive recordings of telephone conversations involving Johnson or oral history interviews with his contemporaries. If you look carefully, you can see QR codes which have been added to allow people access to the recordings on their own phones. This is part of the museum's Covid safety measures.



The central floors of the library hold research archives which are not open to the general public. The central void creates a bold statement in local central Texas limestone. When constructed the building received sever architectural awards.



The top floor of the museum featured a reconstruction of the White House oval office during Johnson's presidency, using many pieces of the original furniture. See below for a photo of the original office. I found it surprising that the lounge was looking nearly as good as new!



Annual Report of the Friends 2021 - 2022.

Committee and General Meetings of this Association have still been limited due to constraints from significant Covid infections within this state. Members of your committee have continued to work and aid the museum's function while responding to needs identified by the Museum Development and Museum Education Officers.

We have managed to self-publish two books with successful sales generating more revenue. With permission of the author's widow, we have prepared Footprints for self-publishing. This will mean that we can arrange to have several copies always available without having to send them out to the printers. Over the years our sales of Footprints have continued with about 1 copy sold per month. The book itself continues to be a drawcard, there has been significant editing work completed by Julia Lindley. Some photos have been updated with the book now presenting the corner near the museum more attractively without the building site for the current bridge.

We have been unable to complete our commitment to provide another display case (or two) due to the Facility Manager not providing us with a design for the same. This also applies to the display case which the Friends wish to purchase for displaying souvenirs and printed items which are fund raising or informational.

A need was however identified for a new model for use during displays within the museum. It was decided that the Friends would purchase both a male and a female model which have been named Nancy and Eddie, both of these named after past Museum volunteers.

(cont. from last column) Apart from that we have upgraded some of the electronic equipment used both by the Friends and by the museum with a 2 TB portable hard drive still to be purchased.

Financially we are good place even with amounts earmarked for the display cases, and we look forward to be able to provide these in the New Year.

Socially, Friends have been invited to several of the Exhibition Openings, there have been more of these this year with successful events such as the Violet Sutton Exhibition, The "Remarkable" Exhibition and currently Policing Mandurah. We were glad to see some of the Friends attend these. Friends are usually invited to all openings of exhibitions or other events at the museum. Jan Baker.
