What is a Visual Story?

A Visual Story provides simple information with images to help explain what an event will be like.

It is designed so people can know what to expect, plan ahead with confidence, and feel comfortable taking part in the event.

This Visual Story has been written for people attending the New Year's Eve (NYE) Fireworks in Mandurah.



New Year's Eve Fireworks

New Year's Eve Fireworks will be held on 31 December.

There will be two displays: 9pm and midnight.

Some people might watch only one display or stay for both.



Fireworks – what to expect

Fireworks are launched into the night sky and burst into colour and light.

There is a sound at launch, followed by a loud boom and crackles that fade as the colours disappear.

Bright flashes and brief smoke may be visible.

When the display finishes, the sky returns to calm.



Managing light and sound

Fireworks can be bright and loud.

People sometimes move further away or wear sunglasses if the light feels too strong.

Noise-reduction earmuffs or earplugs can make the sound easier.

If it still feels uncomfortable, it is ok to leave the event early.



Where to watch

The fireworks can be viewed from several foreshore locations:

- Eastern Foreshore
- Mandjar Square and Boardwalk
- Western Foreshore
- Henry Sutton Grove
- Stingray Point.



Comfort and seating

Picnic rugs and folding chairs are welcome at the event.

Many people arrive early, choose a comfortable spot, and settle in before the 9pm fireworks.



Entertainment

On the Eastern Foreshore there will be family-friendly activities.



Food Trucks

There will be food trucks on the Eastern Foreshore

There will be smells near the food trucks of different food and drinks.



Road closures

There will be some road closures for this event on 31 December from Pinjarra Road to Gibson Street.

Parking

There will be extra temporary ACROD parking at the Mandurah Visitors Centre car park. This is located off Mandurah Terrace, near the Hackett Street roundabout.



Pets and Assistance Animals

To help keep the event safe and comfortable for everyone, this is a pet-free event. Please leave pets at home.

Assistance dogs are welcome and may accompany their handler.

Assistance dogs are specially trained to support a person with disability.



Crowds and staying together

The New Year's Eve Fireworks are very popular and large crowds are expected.

Children are encouraged to stay close to a parent, carer, or trusted adult.

It can help to agree on a meeting point in case anyone becomes separated.



Toilet facilities

There are toilets located on the Western and Eastern Foreshore and near the Mandurah Visitor Centre.

Facilities include male, female and unisex accessible toilets, plus Changing Places near the Visitor Centre and on the Eastern Foreshore.

Changing Places facilities include an adult change table and ceiling hoist. A personal Master Locksmiths Access Key (MLAK) is required for access.
