Get ready for an exciting adventure as we explore some of the most scenic spots that Mandurah has to offer. Designed to be completed over multiple visits, this Mandurah Play Trail includes eight of our favourite locations for kids and families of all abilities! The best part? They can be done in any order.

1 Quarry Adventure Park

From climbing nets and winding slides, take some time to dream up your very own obstacle course! Starting at the hidden quarry, create your own set of obstacles around the park and test them out. What was your favourite activity?



2 Yaaka Park

Explore the trees around the nature play area. Are they bendy, pointy, tall or short? Trees with holes or hollows can be homes for wildlife like possums and birds. Can you spot a tree with a hollow?



3 Koolaanga Waabiny Playground

A 12m-high play tower, an all-abilities swing, and even a human hamster wheel – this playground truly has it all! Koolaanga Waabiny is the Noongar name for the playground – what do you think it translates to? Check out the answer below!

4 Keith Holmes Reserve and Beach

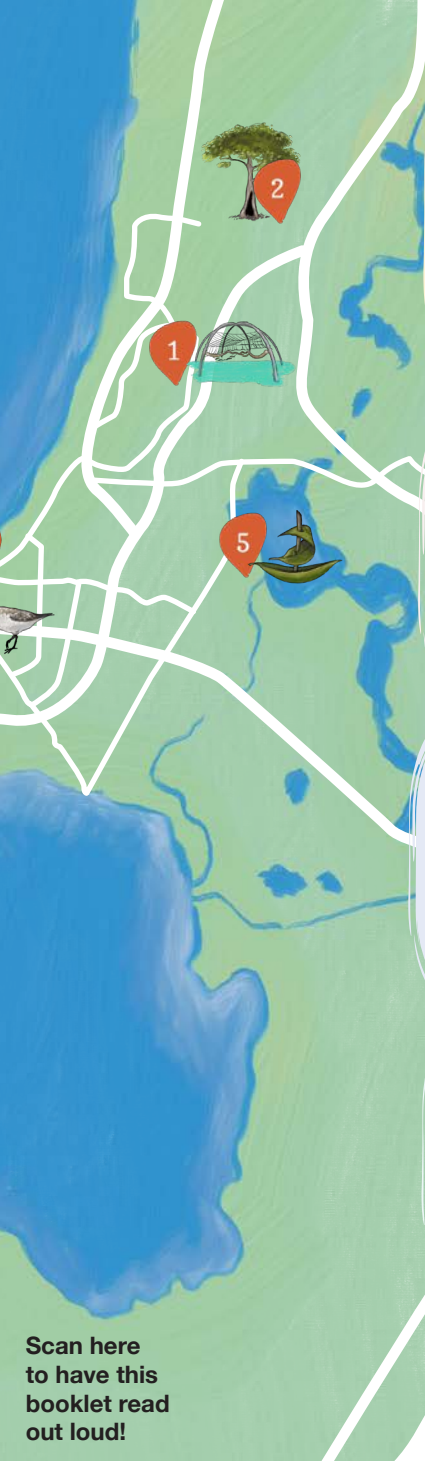

5 Riverside Gardens Reserve

The perfect spot for a nature adventure! Explore the reserve and gather fallen leaves, feathers, bark or sticks. 6 Osprey Waters Foreshore Reserve

7 Dawesville Foreshore Reserve

Nestled along the Peel-Harvey Estuary, this is a popular spot for fishing, boating and crabbing. The estuary provides a unique habitat for aquatic animals like prawns and dolphins. Can you think of other animals that might live here?





8 Samphire Cove Nature Reserve

The reserve is an important feeding and resting area for migratory birds, who fly all the way from Northern Asia and Alaska. How many types of birds can you spot and/or hear? Don't forget to keep a tally!





9 Changing Places

A Changing Places facility is a secure and clean bathroom for people with disability who need space and assistance to manage their bathroom needs while in the community.

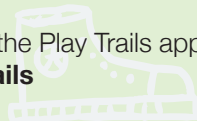
About Play Trails
