



## What is hooning?

*"A hoon driver is anyone who drives at very high speed or in a manner that is considered highly dangerous or anti-social. "*

(definition WA Police)

Hoon driving can include:

- Intentionally causing tyres to lose traction.
- Causing a vehicle to make excessive noise or smoke.
- Exceeding the speed limit by 45km/h or more.
- Engaging in a race or speed trial on a public road or in a public space.



## Report hooning and dangerous driving

If the incident is currently occurring or has occurred in the last 30 minutes and requires immediate Police assistance, please report anti-social driver behaviour or speeding to Police on 131 444.

If the incident is no longer occurring and Police assistance is not required, please lodge a complaint online via the Report a Hoon (Traffic Complaint) form.

**No report, no record, no action!**

## WA Police

Police have the authority to impound vehicles in cases where a driver:

- Exceeds the speed limit by 45km/h or more,
- Drives in a reckless or dangerous manner.

While Police cannot stop every incident, their enforcement powers include:

- Issuing fines,
- Prosecuting offenders in Court,
- Suspending licences, and
- Seizing vehicles.

These act as strong deterrents to unsafe driving behaviour and play a vital role in promoting road safety.



## How can you assist Police?

### **Do not put yourself at risk when trying to gather evidence!**

To effectively address hooning and speeding, Police rely on public assistance. You can help by taking the following steps:

- Record the date and time of the event.
- Obtain the vehicle make, model, colour and most importantly vehicle registration if able.
- Note down description of driver and occupants if able including clothing worn.
- Address of where the vehicle comes from if known.
- Write down what occurred, where they drove, how they drove, and what they did.
- Take video recording if possible or photographs of the incident (not whilst driving).
- Report to Police on 131 444 or online.



## What can the City of Mandurah do?

The City acknowledges that hooning and speeding can be distressing in your neighbourhood. We can take positive steps that encourage safer choices and protect our community on the roads by :

1. If you witness hooning or speeding on Council land or reserves, please report to **City of Mandurah** on **9550 3777** with the Police incident number.
2. If the issue persists and has been reported to Police multiple times, the City may be able to investigate further.

Your reports help us understand the issue and work toward practical solutions.
